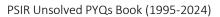

- 2. Part I of this book contains all the questions from 1995 divided into various topics/subtopics as per official syllabus. We have also provided graphs which illustrate the weighage of various topics from last 12 years (2103-2024) vis-à-vis last 4 years (2021-2024).
- 3. These graphs help us understand **relative importance of various topics** and also the **recent trend** in asking questions.
- 4. Wherever the topic was too big, we've **subdivided the questions into subtopics** and also given a graph to illustrate the weightage accordingly.
- 5. Apart from topicwise questions, **Part II of the book also contains Yearwise papers from 1995 to 2024.** This will give you a glimpse into changing PSIR Optional pattern over the years.

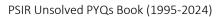
PRACTICES ADOPTED IN THE BOOK

Political Science is a dynamic discipline, and so is the nature of question papers. The exam pattern has changed several times over the past 30 years. So, we felt it necessary to declare some practices we've adopted in this book.

- 1. Some old questions may not be part of the present syllabus, but we've decided to keep them. If the question seems strange, and is from an old question paper, students should not worry about such questions being asked in exams.
- 2. Some questions cover more than one theoretical concept. We've tried to keep such questions in both sections of relevance.
- 3. For graphs illustrating topic-wise weightage, we've only used 2013 onwards questions. This was done since exam pattern drastically changed in 2013. Hence we felt that the analysis of weightage from 2013 onwards is more useful than that from 1995 onwards, which may be misleading.
- 4. Also, each of the topicwise question is suffixed by a question code like this [2024/10m/150w/5e] This code indicates a) year in which the question was asked, b) maximum marks the question carried, c) prescribed word limit and, d) the question number in actual paper, in given order.

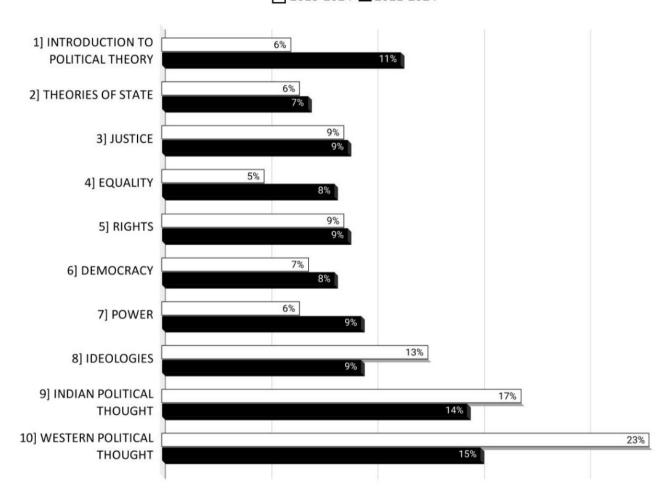

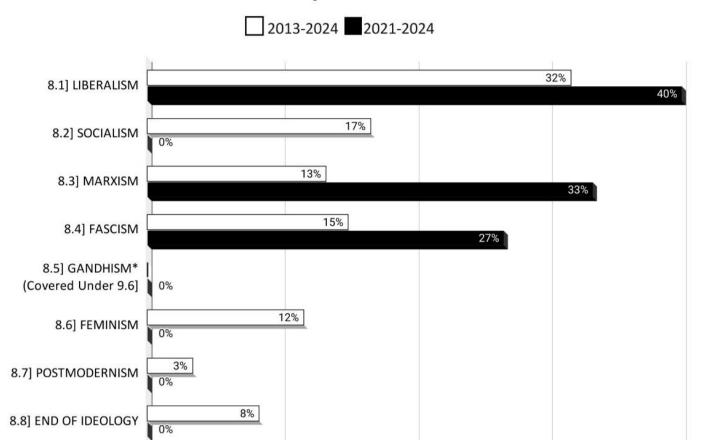

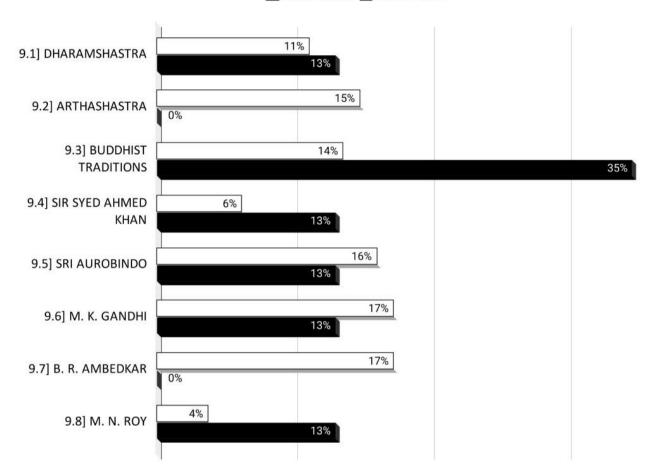
